Don't attack Syria

From The Canadian Peace Alliance: August 27, 2013

The Canadian Peace Alliance (CPA) is calling on all its members and supporters to oppose an impending US-led attack on Syria.

Once again, a report about the use of Weapons of Mass Destruction is being used to justify an intervention. We are always opposed to the use of any weapons on civilians, but as was the case with the last reports of an alleged attack, there is no conclusive proof that the attack came from the Syrian government.

Undaunted by the lack of evidence, US Secretary of State John Kerry has nevertheless declared that the US and its NATO allies will strike Syria. Any intervention by a new "coalition of the willing" will be against international law and must be opposed.

Canadian Foreign Affairs Minister John Baird has said that Canada will be in "lock-step" with its NATO allies. Canadian officials are currently meeting with counterparts from France, the UK and the US to devise strategies for an intervention.

Regardless of what one thinks of either the Syrian government or of the opposition forces, we know from recent experience that:

- NATO and its allies have and will continue to lie about the use of Weapons of Mass Destruction to justify "humanitarian" intervention.
- NATO-led attacks, justified as a "responsibility to protect" (R2P) civilians, have resulted in tens of thousands of civilian deaths. The death toll from military attacks in Afghanistan, Iraq and Libya can be counted in the hundreds of thousands.
- The geopolitical calculations of the NATO powers, and not the interests of ordinary people, are always the main considerations for any intervention.

During the Vietnam War, US officials described a situation where it became necessary to "destroy the village in order to save it." As with all the recent evocations of R2P, it appears that the goal of NATO is to murder civilians in order to save them. We must, therefore, stand in opposition to the actions of the aggressor states in NATO and call on the government of Canada to keep its hands off Syria.

Call for action

Many CPA member groups, as well as coalitions in other countries including the US, have devised emergency response plans in the event of an attack on Syria. The CPA calls upon peace and social justice groups to devise such plans, whether or not an attack immediately involves Canada, and to continue to pressure the Government of Canada and NATO to keep their hands off Syria.

End the Repression in Egypt

From the Canadian Peace Alliance: Aug. 22, 2013

The Canadian Peace Alliance is calling on the government of Canada to use all diplomatic channels at its disposal to call for an end to the attacks on civilians, workers and political parties in Egypt.

Since the military took control of the government on July 3rd, there has been widespread suspension of civil liberties for many Egyptians and a wholesale killing of those protesting military rule.

In any democratic society, people have the right to protest and the members of the Muslim Brotherhood are no exception. While there are many opinions on the nature of the Brotherhood government, this wave of attacks is a concerted attempt by the Egyptian military to rescind the hard won rights of the Egyptian people to have a say in the future of their country. It is part of a counter-revolution designed to roll back the advances made since the January 25 2011 uprising that removed the dictator Hosni Mubarek.

Egypt has long been a lynchpin in US foreign policy in the Middle East with successive puppet governments, propped up by \$1.3 billion in military aid, ready and willing to do their bidding. Canadian arms manufacturers have also sent more than \$14 million in small arms, military aircraft components and other weaponry to the government of Egypt in the last 6 years. We therefore call for the immediate end to all foreign arms shipments to Egypt.

The people of Canada stand firmly in support of the right to free expression and against arbitrary arrest. The government of Canada must respect the will of Canadians and call on the Egyptian military to end the repression.

Hiroshima Day 2013

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Imagine! 68 years have passed since the first attack with Nuclear Weapons and even longer since the testing of nuclear fusion began. People and the environment still suffer from the effects. Sadly, too many have not taken the lessons to heart and continue to mine and process uranium for weapons, electricity, and other products insisting that the processing, storage, safe guards, transportation, mining methods are better than ever. Is it? I don't think so. All it takes is a bit of research and one will realize that the dangers to humanity and the environment are escalating. The effects are evident in the rise of cancer, autoimmune diseases, diabetes, physical deformities and mental disabilities in newborns that can be traced back to radiation. There are those in the scientific community that have consistently warned us that there are no safe levels of radiation but they are regarded the fringe and their research unreliable. Although, these scientists are not intimidated by the nuclear industry or Governmental pressure and continue to issue warnings and plead for disarmament and a total ban of all radiological, atomic and nuclear products, somehow the 'powers that be' convince themselves and intimidate many of our neighbors that there is no danger. Part of the mode of convincing involves reports that minimize the danger; adjust the 'safe levels' as was done in Japan; if any of these reports ever make it into the public domain at all. Dirty Wars, The World is a Battlefield

In *Dirty Wars*, Jeremy Scahill, author of the New York Times best seller *Blackwater*, takes us inside America's new covert wars. The foot soldiers in these battles operate globally and inside the United States with orders from the White House to do whatever is necessary to hunt down, capture or kill individuals designated by the president as enemies.

Dirty Wars follows the consequences of the declaration that "the world is a battlefield," as Scahill uncovers the most important foreign policy story of our time. From Afghanistan to Yemen, Somalia and beyond, Scahill reports from the frontlines in this high-stakes investigation and explores the depths of America's global killing machine. He goes beneath the surface of these covert wars, conducted in the shadows, outside the range of the press, without effective congressional oversight or public debate. And, based on unprecedented access, Scahill tells the chilling story of an American citizen marked for assassination by his own government.

The International Day of Peace, a.k.a. "Peace Day" provides an opportunity for individuals, organizations and nations to create practical acts of peace on a shared date.

In 1981, the United Nations General Assembly, by unanimous vote, adopted Resolution 36/67 establishing the International Day of Peace (IDP) which stated in part, "...to devote a specific time to concentrate the efforts of the United Nations and its Member States, as well as the whole of mankind, to promoting the ideals of peace and to giving positive evidence of their commitment to peace in all viable ways." The first Peace Day was celebrated in September 1982 on the opening day of the General Assembly.

In 2002 the UN General Assembly officially declared September 21 as the permanent annual date for the International Day of Peace.

Peace Day should be devoted to commemorating and strengthening the ideals of peace both within and among all nations and peoples... This day will serve as a reminder to all peoples that our organization, with all its limitations, is a living instrument in the service of peace and should serve all of us here within the organization as a constantly pealing bell reminding us that our permanent commitment, above all interests or differences of any kind, is to peace.

International Day of Peace is also a Day of Ceasefire – personal or political. Take this opportunity to make peace in your own relationships as well as impact the larger conflicts of our time. Imagine what a whole Day of Ceasefire would mean to humankind.
