Continuous Protest at the Israeli Consulate in Toronto

Stop the Bombardment of Gaza: Boycott Israeli Apartheid: Free Palestine

On 24 July 2014, starting at 9 am, people of conscience, including Muslims, Jews, and Christians, are coming together at the Israeli consulate in Toronto for a three day continuous vigil to call attention to the frightening slaughter of the Palestinian people in Gaza and condemn both the Israeli government and the complicity of Canada. We demand that the Canadian government and the international community call for an immediate cessation of Israel's assault against Palestinians in Gaza.

This is the fourth brutal military attack on Gaza since 2006, inflicted on a besieged civilian population intentionally deprived by Israel of the basic necessities of life. We decry the active but silent complicity of the Canadian institutions that enable and profit from Israel's militarism: the public pension funds and Canada's weapon component industries, the Canadian government and political party leaders who refuse to support UN ceasefires and who never invoke the Responsibility to Protect the people of Gaza.

We are outraged by the many other extreme situations of mass murder and cruelty in the world today. But Israel is unique in its pretensions of being the victim when it is one of the world's largest military powers and the possessor of nuclear weapons, its pretensions of being a democracy and of having superior values while harshly discriminating against non-Jews. Israel is unique in having the unquestioning political and economic support for its wars from Canada and major world powers.

Israel sets a dangerous international precedent of legal impunity. Ominous for world safety, the Gaza attacks serve as a proving ground for perfecting and

Who Really Benefits from Canada's Tax Giveaways?

In late May, the Parliamentary Budget Officer released a long-awaited report into the costing and distributional analysis of the tax measures implemented by the federal Conservatives and former Liberal government since 2005. The PBO put the total price tag of the tax cuts implemented during this time at \$30.4 billion annually. This breaks down to \$17.1 billion on the income tax side and \$13.3 billion from the GST/HST cuts. This amount *does not* include cuts to the federal corporate income tax estimated in the range of \$13 billion annually. In total, then, federal tax revenues are in the region of \$43.4 billion lower today than they were a decade ago.

For comparison, consider that reducing post-secondary tuition fees to 1992 levels, as proposed by this year's CCPA Alternative Federal Budget, would cost only \$2.8 billion. Eliminating all university fees in Canada would cost \$5.9 billion a year. For less than the money 'saved' through tax cuts, we could buy both a national pharmacare program (for about \$4.5 billion) and start a national affordable childcare plan (for roughly \$6 billion).

Some on the right of the political spectrum might see \$43.4 billion in annual tax cuts as something to be celebrated. But when you look at what that money could have gone towards, it's obvious the cuts represent a missed opportunity; they have undermined the capacity of our government.

Additionally, consider that these tax cuts were all either implemented or allowed to continue during the period of deficits in recent years. The fact that this government has given away such large amounts in taxes while it was in the red undermines its supposed "financial responsibility" credentials. As CCPA economist Armine Yalnizyan said at the launch of the 2014 AFB: "Canada doesn't have a deficit problem. Canada has a revenue problem."

One of the most interesting things about the PBO report is its distributive analysis of who benefits from these tax measures across the income spectrum and to what degree. From much of the news coverage and chatter on Twitter, it is low-and-middle-income earners who gained the most; therefore the tax cuts were "progressive." The reality is more nuanced and depends on how you define "benefits."

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The PBO provided two ways to look at the distributive effect of the tax cuts: first, as a percentage of after-tax-income, and second, in a raw dollar value broken down by decile (i.e. ten slices of the income spectrum, from poorest to richest). Looking at the tax cuts as a decile as a percentage of a person's total income, we see that those in the third poorest decile appear to have gained the most since they are saving four per cent of their income through tax cuts. The benefits relative to income decline from there. The higher up the income spectrum you go, the lower your tax cut *as a proportion of your income*.

While this meets the technical definition of progressive taxation, just because lower-income households get a higher benefit as a percentage of their income does not mean that most of the benefits go to lower income individuals. Think about it in real dollar terms: four per cent of \$26,905 (the average after tax household income in the third decile) is far less than 2.3 per cent of \$122,146 (the average income in the ninth decile).

If every household in the country got the same share of the \$30.4 billion tax cut, each household would get \$1,939. However, for tax cuts since 2005, according to the PBO analysis, the bottom 50 per cent of Canadian households average benefits of only \$1,130 while the richest five per cent households received average tax breaks of \$4,170—almost four times higher. The cuts look far from progressive from this perspective.

Put another way, the top 20 per cent of income earners, who make at least \$109,000 per year, received more than the entire bottom half of households put together. And nearly half of the total spending on these tax cuts (\$14.9 billion) goes to those in the top three income deciles (graph from article not included).

In short, the Conservative tax cuts have been expensive and it would be grossly inaccurate to say that most of the benefits went to the middle class. You might ask, why we're giving tax breaks to Canada's richest when by all accounts income inequality is pronounced and worsening in Canada. Unfortunately, we don't have an answer because the policy doesn't make sense to us either.

Areva and Niger's uranium fight (Source: Feb 5, 2014 Reuters)

When France began mining uranium ore in the desert of northern Niger in the early 1970s, Arlit was a cluster of miners' huts stranded between the sun-blasted rocks of the Air Mountains and the sands of the Sahara.

The 1973 OPEC oil embargo changed that. France embraced nuclear power to free itself from reliance on foreign oil and overnight this remote corner of Africa became crucial to its national interests.

Arlit has grown into a sprawling settlement of 117,000 people, while France now depends on nuclear power for three-quarters of its electricity, making it more reliant on uranium than any country on earth.

Niger has become the world's fourth-largest producer of the ore after Kazakhstan, Canada and Australia.

But uranium has not enriched Niger. The former French colony remains one of the poorest countries on earth. More than 60 percent of its 17 million people survive on less than \$1 a day.

Arlit is a dusty and neglected place, scoured by desert sandstorms and barely touched by the mineral wealth it ships off to Europe each year. "There are neighborhoods which go without water for three weeks at a time," said Deputy Mayor Hassan Hamani. "There are schools where the pupils have to sit on the floor or study in straw huts."

Now Niger's government is demanding a better deal from Paris, and specifically from state-owned nuclear company Areva. The two sides began talking more than a year ago but failed to clinch an agreement before Areva's 10-year mining contracts expired on December 31.

Areva suspended production at its two sites in Niger in mid-December: the open-cut Somair mine at Arlit and giant underground Cominak pit nearby. The company says the closure was for maintenance but Synamin, a union that represents mining workers, called it a negotiating tactic. Production resumed at the start of February.

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Areva and Niger's just-expired agreements have never been made public. But Reuters has reviewed documents which reveal that Areva's mines pay no export duties on uranium, no taxes on materials and equipment used in mining operations, and a royalty of just 5.5 percent on the uranium they produce. A spokesman for Areva declined to confirm the authenticity of the documents and did not comment on their contents.

Niger's President Mahamadou Issoufou says the deals are a throwback to the post-colonial era, when France played a dominant role in the economies of its former African territories. His government wants to cut the tax breaks and raise the royalty rate - its largest source of income from the mines - to as much as 12 percent.

That would be more than the 5 percent charged by most Australian states, but bring Niger into line with the 13 percent charged by Canada's uranium-producing province of Saskatchewan over the past decade. In Kazakhstan, the official rate is 18.5 percent. Areva produces uranium in both Canada and Kazakhstan but would not detail the royalties it pays in those countries. (It explores for uranium in Australia but does not mine it there).

Mining Minister Omar Hamidou Tchiana, leading the negotiations for Niger, told Reuters the government wants to increase uranium revenues to at least 20 percent of the budget, from just 5 percent at present.

"For 40 years, Niger has been one of the world's largest uranium producers, but it's still one of the poorest countries on the planet," he said. "At the same time, Areva has grown to be one of the world's largest companies. You see the contrast?"

Areva, which produced nearly one fifth of the world's uranium in 2012, says a higher royalty rate would make its business in Niger unprofitable.

With uranium prices down about 70 percent from their peak in 2007, a diplomatic source in Paris said Areva would not agree to a big increase in what it pays Niger. "Niger needs to take into account that Areva is not in great financial health and that the uranium price is low and not about to increase anytime soon," said the source.
